Profile Speaker – Bev Webber

Beverley reflected on her interest and experiences in palliative care. This interest was generated when she worked in the office for trained nurse Joy Nugent in her company Private Palliative Care. After connecting with families needing assistance Bev decided to attend a course run by Professor Maddox to train nurses in palliative care, which she found 'enlightening and of great benefit', especially when her own mother was in nursing care and in need of pain relief.

Bev also described the time she and Brian spent in Cambridge, England with Brian's younger sister Carol and family in her last days with ovarian cancer. Carol was able under the National Health scheme to receive palliative care at home; she was set up in hospital bed downstairs so that members of the family were able to share with her as she faded. Her local doctor and palliative care nurses visited daily. "There was always someone holding her hand; she died peacefully with her husband and children around her."

Fortunately such home palliative care is now available in Adelaide.

A book on the topic that Beverley recommends is The In-Between by Hadley Vlahos a deeply personal memoir from a passionate young Hospice nurse in Florida.

Finally Bev made reference to Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD) which became law in January 2023, offering details obtained via Google.

A punchy tale about a middle aged woman in rehab after an operation. God told her to make the most of it as she only had limited time left on earth, so she had a facelift and a tummy tuck. When the time came she was passed over at the pearly gates. God said sorry I didn't recognise you!

11.00 Guest Speaker – Libby Kosmala, OAM represented Australia at twelve Paralympics from 1972 to 2016 winning 13 medals, 9 gold. She remains the oldest Paralympian at age 74.

Libby has been disabled all her life. Born in 1942 with clubbed feet she had no movement in her legs and lived on the ground crawling around with plaster casts and a pair of her mother's shoes on her hands. Her younger sister until she was 20 months old crawled around with Libby. It was not until Libby was 7 years old that she stood for the first time, in callipers and surgical boots; she had to walk each day but movement was limited.

She attended Loreto Convent School in a wheel chair but there were no suitable toilet facilities appropriate to her needs, Friends at school befriended her and wheeled her around. Her first job on leaving school was as a typist at the Adelaide Botanic Gardens; here she needed to wheel to toilets outside of the office.

Later in life she married and had two children through tough pregnancies worrying about potential disabilities for her children, and became active in swimming and shooting. She also learned to drive a Ford Anglia with hand controls.

Libby has been very active with several committees often as secretary, including the Spina Bifida Association, the National Physiotherapy Board and the Wheelchair Sports Committee.

Her sporting career started with Archery whilst at the Botanic Gardens and broadened into wheelchair track events at the Hampstead Centre. She became active assisting disabled people from the country who wanted to be able to shoot from wheelchairs, which led to her own interest in shooting and Paralympic Gold medals. There are 4 shooting events from a wheelchair, two with air rifles over 10m and two with small bore (22) rifles over 20m.

Libby passed around examples of the small targets including a bullseye from her gold medal in the Seoul Olympics, and an array of her winning medals from a range of competitions.

The talk raised several questions from the floor, answered with humour.

Ken Watson thanked Libby and offered a small gift of appreciation for his engaging talk.
